## “TWO ARE BETTER THAN ONE”

Two are better than one because they have a good return for their labor. For if either of them falls, the one will life up his companion. But woe to the one who falls when there is not another to lift him up” (Ecc 4:9, 10 NASB). Throughout the Bible we see God using companions to accomplish His will. Jesus called twelve men to be His disciples. Amazingly, the apostle Paul had about the same number of people who were his companions in ministry.

Paul’s companions included people like Priscilla and Aquila, Timothy, Barnabas, Silas, Luke, John Mark, Tychicus, Titus, Epaphroditus, Aristarchus, and Epaphras. He used terms like “fellow workers,” “fellow laborer,” “fellow servant,” “fellow soldier,” “fellow prisoner,” and “partner” to describe them. God did not intend for Paul to “go it alone” in ministry. One time he went to Athens alone and the response to his preaching there was minimal (Acts 17:32-34). It is not evident that a church was established. From Athens he proceeded to Corinth. He later wrote, “I came to you [from Athens] in weakness and fear, and with much trembling” (1 Cor 2:3). A spirit and practice of interdependence, not independence, marked Paul’s ministry from that point on.

Paul did not work with unstable people or biblical illiterates. Priscilla and Aquila taught the learned and eloquent Apollos “the way of God more accurately.” They established several churches in their home. Timothy had known the Scriptures from his childhood. Paul chose him to accompany him on his second missionary journey. Paul left Titus in Crete because he trusted the young evangelist to “set in order the things that are lacking.” I’m sure his heart was pained, however, when John Mark disappointed him and Demas deserted him. But he found great joy and comfort working with his mature companions.

None of the “fellow workers” (1 Cor 3:9) of Paul traveled with him all the time. God brought first this one and then that one into his life to be his companion in labor. This appears to be the divine plan. The Holy Spirit told the church in Antioch, “Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them” (Acts 13:2). Those

who work alone cannot accomplish as much as what companions can achieve working together. “Two are better than one.” God gave Aaron to Moses, Jonathan to David, Baruch to Jeremiah, and Elisha to Elijah. King Saul failed as a leader because he saw David as a threat. Moody always traveled with Sankey. Shea always sang for Graham. For many years the triumvirate at my *alma mater* was Hunt, Barber, and McMorrow.

I thank God that Don DeWelt invited me to work alongside him in publishing *One Body* and coordinating the Restoration Forums. I learned much from him in the seven short years that we had together. I am truly happy for the many people whom God has brought into my life to help me. I mention literally *hundreds* of them in my autobiography. Henry Blackaby suggests that to refuse to work with God’s people is an affront to God, an embarrassment to Christ, a shameful act within the church. To minister alone is to deny God’s primary strategy in the New Testament. “Two are better than one.” Compare a saying from the Talmud: “A man without companions is like the left hand without the right.” Even the Lone Ranger had Tonto!

The “curse” of the “independent” fellowship of churches that I am affiliated with is that too many are just that – *independent*. But the Bible we all believe and preach tells us that “we are God’s fellow workers.” Jesus did not work alone. The apostle Paul did not work alone. They had their “true companions.” Paul wrote to one as follows: “And I urge you also, true companion, help these women who labored

with me in the gospel, with Clement also, and the rest of my fellow workers, whose names are in the Book of Life” (Phil 4:3 NIV). The Greek word “companion” (*syzgos*) means “yokefellow; harnessed together; pulling with a common purpose and goal.” We rob ourselves of fellowship, friendship, and fruitfulness when we choose to do ministry solo. After all, the song is “Onward Christian Soldiers” – not “Onward Christian Soldier.”

“Two people are better off than one, for they can help each other succeed” (NLT). A good companion is the difference between success and failure.

Jesus did not work alone.  
The apostle Paul did not work alone.  
They had their “true companions.”

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## LESSONS ON THE 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE SINKING OF THE TITANIC

This month marks the 100th anniversary of the sinking of *RMS Titanic*. Several years ago I visited the shipyards in Belfast, Northern Ireland, where the great White Star Line ship was built. Before its maiden voyage from Southampton to New York on April 10, 1912, Mrs. Alfred E. Caldwell, a passenger, was told by a deckhand, “Lady, God himself could not sink this ship.” But on the night of April 14 the *Titanic* struck an iceberg. The \$10 million floating palace sank at 2:20 on the morning of April 15. Fifteen hundred souls went with her to the bottom of the ocean.


The cover story of the March 2012 *Smithsonian* magazine, “Shadow of the *Titanic*,” tells of one survivor’s harrowing story. Dorothy Gibson, 22, was in Lifeboat 7. “Suddenly there was a wild coming together of voices from the ship and we noticed an unusual commotion among the people about the railing. Then the awful thing happened, the thing that will remain with me in my memory until the day I die.” Dorothy listened as 1,500 people cried out to be saved, a noise she described as a horrific mixture of yells, shrieks and moans. “No one can describe the frightful sounds.” *This dreadful scene reminds us of what it means to be a lost soul and what Judgment Day will be like.*

When I was in Belfast I learned about the fatal flaw in the *Titanic*. It was in her superstructure herself – chemical impurities in the steel. The huge steel plates in her keel buckled when she hit the iceberg. Water rushed in at a horrifying rate of seven tons per second. All of her “watertight” compartments were full within one hour. *If the church is not built right (“set in order”), the water of the world will rush in and take its deadly toll.*

There were only 16 wooden lifeboats and four canvas “collapsibles” on the *Titanic* – not nearly enough for all the passengers and crew. Lifeboat 7, like most of the others, put out to sea only half full. *Government programs, technology, science, and education are totally insufficient to save mankind; only Jesus saves.*

The *Titanic* received no fewer than six warnings about icebergs ahead, but Captain Smith never notified the bridge. *Our national leaders have woefully abdicated their responsibilities, failing to heed the warnings of financial and moral danger ahead.*

Of the 1500 people who went down on the *Titanic*, only 13 were rescued from the icy ocean. Only Lifeboat 14 returned to pick up the perishing. Third officer Pitman



said, “In boat after boat the story was the same: a timid suggestion [to rescue the perishing], a strong refusal, nothing done.” But when Captain Roston of the *Carpathia* received the first SOS in maritime history, he fired off a message: “Tell them we are coming as fast as we can!” He cut off the heat and hot water and poured every ounce of steam into the boilers as they raced to the rescue. Chief Steward Hughes said, “Every man to his post and let him do his full duty like a true Englishman.” *The church has a moral and spiritual obligation to cut back on some things and put full effort into reaching those who are in peril.*

*Smithsonian* also reports that today the third most recognized word in the world is “*Titanic*” (“God” and “Coca-

Cola" are number one and number two). The sinking of the *Titanic* is a universal reminder of the tragedy of being lost, the necessity of building things right, the inadequacy of man to save, the delinquency of some in leadership, and the heroic efforts of others to "rescue the perishing, care for the dying, snatch them in pity from sin and the grave."


