On our very first pilgrimage to Cassia we noticed that the walls of the convent were covered with regular little holes as if made by a drill. It was explained to us that these holes were the hives of "St. Rita's Bees." These white bees could be called the first admirers of our Holy Saint.

According to tradition, as a baby Rita was asleep in her cot when a swarm of bees swarmed around her, they didn't sting her, but dropped sweet pollen into her mouth. The tradition continues, a farmer who had just been badly cut with his scythe saw the swarm and tried to chase them away but as he wave his wounded arm it was immediately cured.

When St. Rita finally entered the convent in Cascia her little blessed friends followed her and made their homes in the convent walls and, as we pilgrims witnessed, they are still there to this very day. Around 1630, Pope Urban is said to have asked to see one of the white bees and, having seen it, asked for a tiny silk thread to be attached to it and then set it free. A few days later it was discovered back at the convent over 60 miles away.

St. Rita is the patron of the impossible, this might explain another strange phenomenon. Every year during Holy Week the bees come out of the walls of the convent to gather pollen, they fly around until 22nd of May, St. Rita's feast day and then return to hibernation in the safety of the convent walls until Holy Week of the following year. They are the constant companions of the nuns while they do the work of the Lord, and it would seem as if the little winged creatures were encouraging the work of the sisters by their continual humming and buzzing. These little friends are symbols of loyalty and trust in our great patron. May they continue to be a presence to the nuns in the convent at Cassia and an aid to our growth in faith.

I know there are sceptics who will say the stories of the mysterious bees are pure coincidence, that's as maybe, but as Christians and people of faith, we do believe in miracles. Just sometimes the only hope left to us is that of a miracle. In which case who better to turn to than St. Rita patron of the helpless.

Our novena to St. Rita begins on 14th May and finishes at her Mass on 22nd May. I do hope you will be able to join in with us. The Recollect Priests will remember you all in the Mass on St. Rita's feast day with a prayer of thanksgiving for your continued support.
