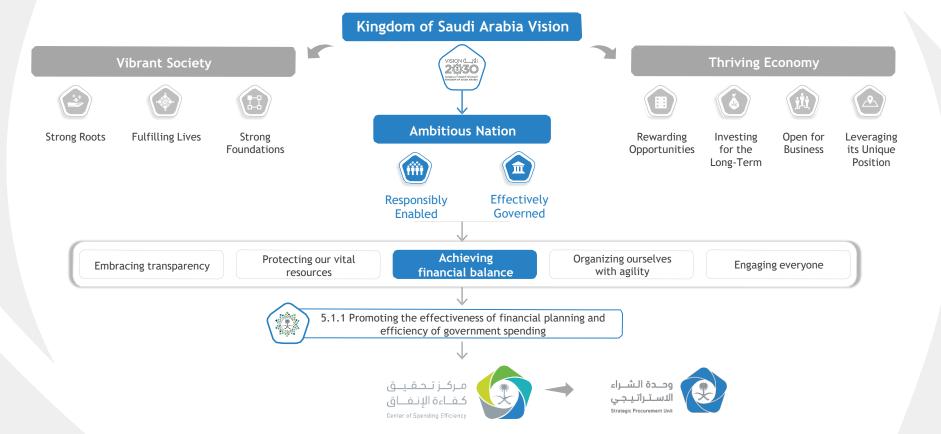

In line with Vision 2030 objectives and the new Government Tenders and Procurement law, the Strategic Procurement Unit was launched to achieve financial balance in KSA





The Strategic Procurement Unit engages with key stakeholders and entities to ensure effective and efficient implementation of its mandate





Today, the government system faces several challenges across multiple dimensions within the procurement ecosystem















Absence of the unified vision of government procurement whereas each entity manages procurement process independently and in a way different from other entities



Lack of mechanisms to support SMEs and support local content



Poor exploitation of purchase power in negotiations with suppliers



Difference capacities and experiences of employees of government procurements in different entities



Lack of reference pricing and benchmark of the unit cost and cost elements



Failure to direct spending through purchases effectively which support the strategic objectives

Lack of annual and periodic reports on government purchases

Initiatives

- Framework agreements
- Two Steps Contracting
- Electronic reverse bidding
- Sign framework agreements on behalf of entities for common goods and services
- Review government entities' Request For Proposals prior to rolling them out
- Develop of all procurement documents
- Conduct training and capability building programs
- Include local content, SME and listed companies preference mechanisms
- Ensure support for contractors and private sectors
- Introduce the concept of advance planning for business and purchases
- Increase transparency of procedures though electronic systems and mandate transactions through the "Etimad Portal"
- Improve the complaints mechanism
- Develop and implement supplier's evaluation criteria and policies
- Develop a standard mechanism for evaluating technical and financial proposals
- Introduce pre and post qualification
- Approve contracting according to performance to ensure the quality of final deliverables
- Impose higher fines (in percentage) in continuous implementation contracts



Furthermore, the new Government Tenders and Procurement law mandates the Strategic Procurement Unit with five key functions within its scope of responsibility

Functions within SPU's scope of responsibility





Define services and products which are common across government entities, unify technical specifications, launch procurement process, receive, evaluate and select bids, and sign framework agreements on behalf of government entities



Prepare lists of products and services for which framework agreements were signed and enable government entities to review these lists and framework agreements through the portal.



Review business cases and estimated costs of products and services, as submitted by government entities, as well as any related tender and prequalification documents, if any, and provide insights within the period specified in the regulation



Prepare forms for tender documents, pre-qualification documents, contracts, vendor performance assessment, and any other document required, in accordance with provisions of the law and regulation



Prepare the necessary training programs for developing qualifications and skills of officials responsible for implementation of provisions of this law in government entities.

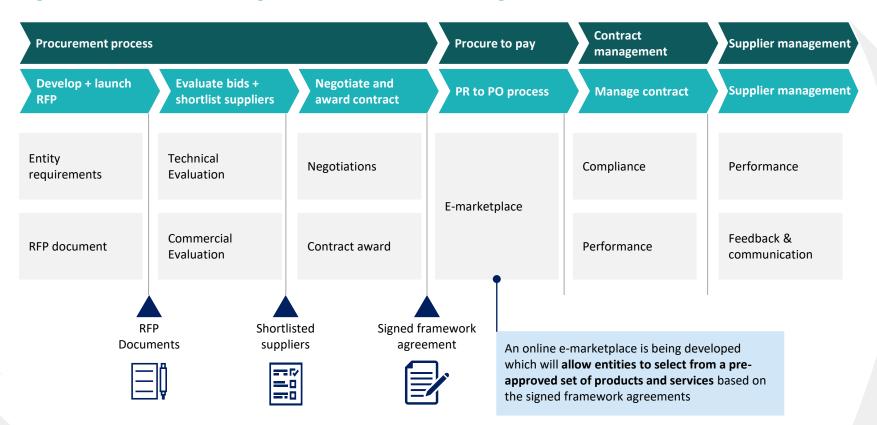
