Apex Park the place to be this Saturday




WANGARATTA is celebrating and recognising its First People, the Bpangerang tribe, at a community nature day this weekend in conjunction with the Wangaratta Farmers Market.

The event, organised by Wangaratta Urban Landcare Group and the Sustainability Network, seeks to inform the community and provide the opportunity to celebrate the region's "amazing natural diversity".

As well as a number of environmentally themed displays and a free barbecue, Ian Davidson, president of the Urban Landcare Group, is particularly excited about the Indigenous culture parts of this year's event.

"We have been in planning for nearly two years for this year's event after the respected Bpangerang elder Uncle Freddie Dowling spoke at our AGM in 2016," Mr Davidson said.

accounts of his people's historical and spiritual stories of this region left a huge impression on many of us, and we thought this is something the Wangaratta community would love to know, and Uncle Freddie was generously prepared to share."

The free event invites members of the community to watch Bpangerang dancers, learn about indigenous history in Wangaratta, Bpangerang traditional culture, a walk along Bullawah trail, and many more activities.

Mr Davidson said this year's Nature Day "promises to be bigger and better than ever and a great opportunity for the public to get an understanding of our region's unique cultural history and natural world".

Community encouraged to have their say on our CBD's future

COMMUNITY members are being invited to help guide the look and growth of Wangaratta's CBD.

The Draft Wangaratta Urban Design Framework (Draft UDF) is currently on exhibition and the Rural City of Wangaratta council will tomorrow hold a drop in session for public members.

It will be held in the council chamber at the Wangaratta Government Centre between 3.30pm and 6.30pm.

Council strategic planning staff will be on hand at the drop in session to explain what the Draft UDF is and how people can make comments on the document.

Rural city mayor Ken Clarke said the Draft UDF follows on from work completed in the CBD Masterplan, Central Activities Area Framework Plan and the Railway Precinct Masterplan.

"The Draft UDF will provide council with the tools to guide future growth and redevelopment of the CBD in a sustainable, positive way," he said.

"The city is developing and council wants to work with the community to develop in the right direction."

Cr Clarke said the Draft UDF aims to support redevelopment in the CBD, make it cycling and pedestrian friendly and give direction about streetscaping.

It is on public exhibition until December 14 this year.

IT seems the proliferation of cooking shows is inspiring even the youngest of chefs and two local primary schools have joined together to use their culinary skills to help others.

Carraragarmungee Primary School students visited their friends at Everton Primary School last week to create three dishes for the Wangaratta Carevan.

The students have all

experienced the Stephanie Alexander Garden Program where they have not only learned about the benefits of fresh garden produce but also how to translate that joy onto the plate.

"It's a way for the students to utilise the skills they've learned through the program and help the community as well," Lyne Newton, the Stephanie Alexander teacher said. The children prepared pumpkin soup, penne bolognaise and penne carbonara and then packed them for the Carevan to freeze and use when required. Back in August the Everton Primary School students prepared a five course meal as a fundraiser and later this month they will be catering for approximately 30 people visiting the Everton hall.

"It's about healthy cooking and eating, and getting involved with the community along the way," Ms Newton said.
